





Introduction





Sukaar Foundation

Sukaar Foundation, an indigenous organization of Tharparkar is playing a pivotal role to uplift the lives of rural vulnerable masses through addressing income generation, livelihood, food security, nutrition, education, water, sanitation, health, hygiene and equity inclusion. SF started this journey 12 years earlier in WASH sector, which further expanded to community empowerment through democratically federating them on village level platforms and promoting their self-driven collective efforts.

Sukaar is substantially contributing to bridge the gap between local communities and potential donors. Targeted people are capacitated to list down most pressing needs and consult with state and non-state actors to channelize resources for desired responses. Sukaar is also conducting major advocacy programs and events to promote basic WASH rights of targeted communities.

Moreover, development of water security planning for Tharparkar is one among major milestones covered under this journey. Various International Day celebration is done including Global Hand Washing Day, World Water Day, Toilet Day etc to advocate and promote WASH understanding. Sukaar also ensures service delivery in various other sectors including food security, nutrition, health and hygiene.

Besides, the organization has very vast experience in imparting emergency relief and recovery projects. Sukaar has so far implemented multifarious interventions including response in drought, food distributions, cash for trainings, provision of safe drinking water, sanitation facilities, hygiene education, school WASH, equity inclusion, rainwater harvesting initiatives and water security planning.

During flooding of 2010, flash floods 2011, drought situations 2013, 2014 and 2015, Sukaar has implemented relief and recovery projects

focused on provision of food items, drinking water facilities, high-energy biscuits, juices, livestock fodder, medicine etc. In Thar Desert Sukaar has played leading role in introducing innovative rainwater harvesting practices, constructed various household level and communal water harvesting structures, in around 320 villages. It has worked with various international donors and UN Agencies including WFP, UNICEF, WaterAid, BIG Lottery Fund, World Bank, ADP, IDRF, Oxfam, USAID Rapid Fund, Welthungerhilfe -WHH and Government of Sindh.

SF with collaborative efforts of community leaders, supporting partners and its core team has achieved significant success in leading the Thari community towards self-reliance.

Village Development Organization (VDO) established by SF and Community is a brilliant example of the community based leadership and village institutions taking care of their human, livestock and natural resources. Development agreements reached with VDOs and SF are examples of bilateral relationships and collaboration to bring socio economic change in Thari society. Good governance and democratic practices are ensured and foundation is laid of good practices in society for others to replicate.






Community Empowerment

Sukaar Foundation gives highest priority to build people's capacities and envisages to engage local communities in all decision-making and collective implementation of community level initiatives. In order to contribute effectively towards SF's vision and mission, it is imperative to engage local communities holistically in their own development and build their capacities for self-reliance. SF works with partners and donors to build the managerial and organizational capabilities of local communities. Through trainings, exposure visits and technical inputs the communities are empowered to manage their own resources and explore possibilities for sustaining community driven projects.

Sukaar Foundation is fostering community organizations network at grassroots level. Local communities are democratically federated into Village Development Organizations (VDOs), who further impart various community level interventions devised with social and technical assistance of SF field team. Currently, 4,522 male members and 2,261 women members are taking part in shared vision of SF and local communities through



323 VDOs. These communities are further trained and engaged for identifications of problems, resources mobilization, designing and implementation of schemes for their villages. SF believes that community empowerment may not be ensured without behavioral change cum access to alternatives livelihood options. Hence, SF is promoting centuries old traditional practices, upgraded with technological assistance, including rainwater harvesting, ground water recharge, securing water at village level and promotion of domestic commodities (handicraft) for income generation, through active involvement of the communities.





WASH (Water, Sanitation & Hygiene)

Sukaar Foundation has institutionalized its capabilities for WASH advocacy in Tharparkar, it has been working to uplift WASH status in the district. SF is implementing different projects which are contributing directly to achieve sixth major SDG, "Ensure access to water and sanitation for all". SF in collaboration with HSBC, BIG Lottery, WaterAid Pakistan, USAID/Concern-RAPID-Fund and IDRF is providing clean & accessible water, improved sanitation and hygiene awareness to communities. A total of 500 rainwaterharvesting tanks are constructed, 15 old dug wells are rehabilitated, 12 new Solar Powered Submersible Water Pumps and 208 hand pumps are installed.

SF also improved the adequate sewage disposal through construction of demo latrines in communities, triggering process for declaring ODF village, construction/rehabilitation of Child Friendly Toilets, Hand Washing Pads in 40 schools / villages.

Water Security Planning:

SF in collaboration with BIG Lottery Fund-UK and WaterAid Pakistan is working to develop the water security plan Tharparkar. SF followed the stepwise strategy and completed supporting studies, collected primary data and secondary data.

- Desk review of available hydrological data of Tharparkar
- Water point mapping of selected 75 Villages
- Village Level Water Security Plan of selected 75 Villages.
- Tested Different models (water structures/sources) in selected 75 villages.



After completion of first phase, SF selected a well-reputed consultant through competitive bid process. The consultant submitted the outlines of Water Security Planning Tharparkar and presented to Project Steering Committee. The committee approved this outline, first draft of the report is already submitted and reviewed by Sukaar Foundation and WaterAid Pakistan. It is assumed that the consultant will submit final WSP Tharparkar report till end of



the year 2016, incorporating all feedback, for approval and endorsement.

Poverty Reduction & Food Security



Poverty Reduction & Food Security

Sukaar Foundation works with most marginalized communities who are deprived of basic life amenities and dwindling in vicious poverty cycle. Tharparkar is drought prone area where it happens to repeat twice to thrice in each decade. The prolonged consequent droughts caused dilapidation of economic activities combined with food shortage and dearth of fodder. However, in last two decades' droughts are more frequents. Study conducted by Sukaar Foundation depicts that Tharparkar has witnessed 11 mild to severe drought during last 17 years, causing a massive loss of livelihood and degradation of natural resources. This situation has compounded the problem of poverty & food security in this region.


Sukaar Foundation through its various projects is providing employment opportunities, cash grants and cash in lieu of work/trainings. Various income generation opportunities are also created and promoted including trainings of artisan women& engaging local labour (CFW) in different projects. Besides, livestock, the major livelihood source of Tharparkar, is secured through provision of livestock fodders and imparted livestock management trainings. More importantly in poor and malnourished areas, SF has provided monthly food ration in various targeted villages. To address most marginalized communities, as already identified by BISP score card, SF is in process to provide cash grants to uplift them out of vicious poverty cycle.

Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR)

Sukaar Foundation has been working since 2005 in Thaparkar and the area is disaster prone area where droughts occurrence is very frequenting.Last four consequent years have faced mild to severe droughts where livelihood of people was badly affected. These droughts caused shortage of food, livestock fodder and safe drinking water, in rural areas of Tharparkar.




In the reporting year, Sukaar

Foundation has supported 4500 drought-affected families of two UCs of Taluka Mithiand three UCs of Taluka Chachro. Regarding this provided the VANDA & Wheat Straw to 19,000 animals for three months & all these animals vaccinated, 21,000 people benefited from livestock activities (livestock fodder, Vaccine & Livestock Management Trainings) and provided two months' ration to 1500 drought affected families.

Advocacy, Lobbying & Networking

Advocacy, Lobbying, Networking and influencing are important activities carried out by SF on regular basis. Policy and decision makers at district, provincial and national level are regularly informed of the successful experiences of SF and difficulties faced during the course of work with target communities. Case studies, E- Newsletter, Annual Reports, Periodical Drought Alerts, Posters, Brochures and Pamphlets are sent to disseminate information about SF-Community participatory work. Many partners are also kept abreast of SF initiatives through email system.

Networking with various organizations for learning and sharing experiences is one of the important activities of SF. Presently SF is leading the District WASH Forum, Tharparkar& a regular member & Joint Secretory of Marooara Coordination Council, Tharparkar.

Lobbying and networking with networks many times helps to influence the policies and decisions of the member organizations.



The Board of Directors of SF are dedicated persons who give their time and valuable inputs for better management of SF work with communities. SF has an effective Board of Directors. SF is trying to set an example of a Board with women participation and gender balance. Current BoD summons around each quarter in the year!







Sustainable Institutional Development

Participation

Sukaar Foundation encourages targeted communities to participate in VDOs, formed at village level for implementation and monitoring of the project activities. In all community level interventions Sukaar ensures adequate participation of all segments of society including marginalized communities (women, children, old age and scheduled minority representatives). Community participation does ensure ownership and sustainability of community driven projects / programmes.



Gender Mainstreaming

Gender equality and women empowerment is core of SF's programs and strategies. Gender mainstreaming is ensured in all programs/projects and organizational policies. Gender perspective is manifested in its vision and mission and is ensured through integrating it during program design and implementation. During 2015-16 SF's' gender program worked proactively to achieve the goal of women empowerment.



SF developed policies and procedures that are giving proper path for gender mainstreaming. It works on 02 different level such as one recruitment and another at field level. SF encourage female, oppressed for becoming part of its team, and provides equal space in capacity building opportunities. While working at grass-root level SF formed combined (Male & Female) and separate female Village Development Organizations for ensuring decision making at all level. Generally, these VDOs are regularly meeting on monthly basis and participating in capacity building activities, particularly they are advocating for WASH Rights on different forum.



SF always provides space to female staff members to participate in decision-making process and encourage them to be on senior positions. About the beneficiaries SF equally adopt the process and distribute the resources and services provided to men and women, boys and girls. SF has policy for project and programme beneficiaries and employment. SF creates opportunity without any discrimination and on the basis of equality and equity.

Human rights.

Sukaar Foundation believes that human rights are inborn rights of every individual belong to any caste, creed, sect, dogma or religion. Human beings who are attached to planet they deserve to be free and peaceful, all human should be equally treated and have chance to exercise their rights with great zeal. Sukaar, with the slogan, Peace, prosperity and joy, raises voice against ill actions of human rights dictators of the community who deliberately engulf the rights of other fellow beings. Sukaar is in opposition to all those forces, which perpetuate, practice, or believe in the violence on women and children.



Sis working to cultivate young leadership in Tharparkar. The WASH Clubs formed in Govt. Schools is major initiative to produce young leaders among Govt. Primary Schools. Besides, skill enhancement is a continued process to enable them raise their voice to demand their WASH rights. There are various model structures in Govt. Schools playing their role in improving WASH status, after evaluating the impact of this intervention these clubs are rapidly replicating in rest of the schools of the district.





Age & Disability

SF adopts the strategy that ensures the inclusion of Age & Disability in all of its interventions and staff hiring process. While designing, and implementing projects, organization focuses to benefit old age and disable population. SF made it possible to orient key staff members on "Inclusion of Age and Disability" through organizing a training with support of Concern Worldwide that shows SF's commitment for subject



matter. Sukaar have precise methodology for project designing through conducting Need Assessments and issues prioritization in which it collects, Age, Sex, Gender, disable segregated data, it gives insight for incorporating the age and disability in it's short and long-term projects.

Voluntarism Development

SF works with downtrodden masses, which do not have sufficient resources to fulfill their needs, because these rural areas are most neglected in terms of equal resource distribution and provision of basic amenities. During the work with communities, SF observed that despite of many lacks and deficiency of resources. There is huge human resource available in the villages which might be utilize in positive activities otherwise their precious time will be divested without aim of their life. SF compares the Human resources available at villages with resources and capacity of the organization and took it as core responsibility to organize and create voluntarism among them.



Transparency & Accountability

Sukaar Foundation is ensuring complete transparency and accountability in all its projects and programs. All the records, documents and books of accounts at SF are left transparent and open to access for all stakeholders. VDOs at community level are sheer example of transparency and accountability of SF intervention, since, communities



impart and undertake all desired interventions at their own. Audits reports, external evaluations and monitoring reports depict adequate transparency and accountability adopted by SF.

Furthermore, SF has established well organized "Compliance and Response Mechanism", to ensure transparency and accountability in its projects and programmes. CRM plays crucial role of monitoring & evaluation by the communities to design and deploy prioritized projects for the communities. SF finds itself accountable to all its stakeholders including local communities, partners and donors.
